


From the Editor

Ronald Maddox died on 14 November 2018 at the grand age of 88 - his obituary was published in *The Times* 23 January 2019. The obituary reports the words of Stuart Rose the |Post Office design adviser, who noted that 'to condense 600 or 700 years of ecclesiastical architecture into five little stamps is no mean feat'. How true. He also designed the official first day cover for the Earls Barton stamp, and a number of these bear his signature with a number - denoting how many he signed (over 150). These covers were the subject of my first contribution to *First Day Coverage* back in 2009 (Issue No. 91).

The world of philately and first day cover collecting includes many fine stamps and covers. Those of Ronald Maddox are a magnificent realisation of just what can be achieved. I salute them.

Magical Worlds 21 July 1998

In 1998, the Post Office issued 10 special issues. These included (for me the highlight of the year) - 'Magical Worlds'. which featured five stamps celebrating J R R Tolkien's The Hobbit; C S Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe; E Nesbit's - The Phoenix and the Carpet; Mary Norton's The Borrowers; and Lewis Carroll's Through the Looking-Glass.

There was some significance in the last one, as 1998 was the 100th anniversary of the death of Lewis Carroll. Adrian Bradbury was aware of this and went into over-drive - with Carroll related covers for each one of the ten 1998 issues - thus, for example his covers for 'Endangered Species' (20 January 1978), featured the Dodo from *Alice*. Adrian also created some Gerald King covers for the actual 14 January centenary date. So for the Lewis Carroll collector 1998 was a vital year. Adrian produced two different Alice related covers for the actual Magical Worlds issue - one has a fine full colour picture of the Tea Party by Gerald King (some covers were signed by him), and one has Tenniel's Jabberwock.

There was a large number of covers with special handstamps referring to Lewis Carroll places - Oxford, Daresbury etc. etc.

With five different books and authors featured in the issue, it was inevitable that the number of relevant issues was pretty high, but, as ever, dealers responded to the challenge with some eagerness.

I wrote about the extensive range of E Nesbit covers from this issue in First Day Coverage: No. 112 February 2013 - Benham included no less than four 'official' Nesbit covers, as well as a series of small covers, one for each of the stamps, and also five `Hand Painted Originals' covers -one for each of the stamps (numbered 'a to 'e') each of them limited to 50 numbered examples.

Tolkien and C S Lewis of course feature prominently with some lovely Pictorial Hand Stamps – a lion for Lewis, a dragon for Tolkien.

Benham also produced a number of official covers for the Variety Club, each one of them showing a picture of a 'celebrity' (e.g. Ben Kingsley and Philip Schofield).

Benham produced an impressive range of great covers for this issue – including a series with a 'Flower Fairy' PHS and with relevant Isle of Man crown coins encased in the cover. They also issued five covers, one for each stamp – featuring a special picture by Simon Postgate – these are usually found with just the one relevant stamp.

Rugby Football Heritage issued a fine cover – though whether this was because Lewis Carroll attended Rugby School I have no idea – certainly there is no indication that they know anything about that. 'Autographed Editions' produced a large FDC attached to a card carrying details about Terry Pratchett, and signed by him.

I discussed the large number of covers with relevant meter marks in *First Day Coverage* April 2013. Unusual pictorial Hand stamps abound – e.g. Aberdeen with a picture of a cat,

Dillons bookshop with the PHS shaped like a book, and the Newcastle Yellow Brick Road appeal with a picture of cartoon lion.

For some reason there were a number of covers issued by the Royal Air Force - though their relevance to Magical Worlds escapes me.

The large variety of covers for this issue is quite remarkable - one could also mention Havering's fine cover celebrating Dick Whittington; M Tanner's cover with a picture of Alice and characters on a sliding chess board; 'Luxury' with a fine series of 5 large covers with different colour pictures from Tenniel - again these are usually found with just the one stamp; and the fine cover produced by GB covers of Harrogate, with a large PHS for 'Child's Way, London, and elaborately illustrated cover.

Ir is a curious fact that for many Stamp issues there is one cover that you might call a 'high point' -.i.e. pretty rare and with a value far above other covers in the same issue (e.g. the Palitoy cover for the Year of the Child). For 'Magical Worlds' I would suggest the Blair Atholl Scout cover is of this category - Mike Brazier and I discussed this in First Day Coverage August and October 2016.

Phil Stamp Covers

"Love them or hate them this series is most certainly different" Bradbury wrote of Phil Stamp covers in his FDC catalog.

I become a fan after I discovered and purchased my first Phil Stamp cover on ebay around 2006. Later I bought many hundreds of Phil covers including some one-off issues from the founder Steve Oliver. All the covers feature "Phil the Stamp" in a comic cartoon scene along with a snail and a small X that looks like a band aid.

I don't know how he came up with the idea but Steve began experimenting with Phil FDCs in 2000 by sending a few to himself (see Queen Mother scan with and without address shown). The numbered Phil series officially began with the "Hopes for the Future" issue of 2001 (see scan). Only a few of each cover were produced back then, mostly to create interest and give away at stamps shows. Covers were produced for both Commemorative and Definitive stamps issues and were illustrated by Steve's cousin J Edward Oliver. All were in the "Classic" style which featured a cartoon outline with no colour. In 2002 JEO began experimenting with the use of colour as shown by this proto-type of the "Just So Stories" issue which Steve discovered after his cousin's death in 2007 (see scan). In addition to being coloured for the first time the design is a little different to the final version, which incidentally bore the first official Phil Stamp postmark. Colour versions were offered for sale starting with the "Circus" issue of 2002.

A "Colonel Hector" series was introduced in 2004 for Smiler stamps and Guest Artists illustrated covers periodically from 2008 until 2010. There was also an "Agnes Quont" series of five covers plus occasional hand coloured (by Steve Oliver) and multi-year postmark editions. (see scan of Sounds/Beatles). A few Channel Island covers were also produced. One of my favourite one offs is the 2004 Occasions cover hand signed by JEO and also the stamp artist, who added a pair of feet and a bird under the stamps (see scan).


Sadly Christmas 2010 marked the issuing of the final Phil cover. Steve had sold off his older cover inventory to a dealer before that and for a while they were very common on ebay and I bought hundreds. Steve sold his own personal copies of covers and the original artwork in 2011 (see scan) which is how I acquired my one offs. Starting around 2013 Phil Stamp covers began selling on ebay for very high prices, sometimes even multiple hundreds of pounds as a couple of collectors in particular bid against each other. The prices have come down some since then but the covers are still highly sought after and often sell for much more than their cost at time of issue which is a testament to their great quality, originality and relatively short production time.

Invaders from Mars!

"No one would have believed in the middle of the 20th Century that human affairs were being watched keenly and closely by intelligences greater than Man's. Yet, across the gulf of space on the planet Mars, intellects vast and cool and unsympathetic regarded our Earth with envious eyes, slowly and surely drawing their plans against us..."

One of my all-time favorite movies has always been the 1953 science fiction classic The War of the Worlds, which starred Gene Barry as Dr. Clayton Forrester and Ann Robinson as Sylvia Van Buren. It is the story of mankind's seemingly futile efforts to repel an invasion from the planet Mars.


The movie was an adaptation of a book of the same title by British author H. G. Wells (1866-1946), which was published in 1898. For the movie, the action was transplanted from the English countryside to southern California.

A War of the Worlds single was included in a set of four Science Fiction postage stamps issued by Great Britain's Royal Mail on June 6, 1995, to commemorate the 100^{th} Anniversary of the publication of H. G. Wells' The Time Machine. The year 1995 also marked the 50^{th} anniversary of Wells' death. The other two stamps in the set commemorated Wells' The First Men in the Moon (1901) and The Shape of Things to Come (1933).

Although I primarily collect US FDCs, I thought it might be a fun project to try to assemble a collection of British War of the Worlds First Day Covers. I soon learned that single stamp FDCs were not readily available; unlike the US, where a set of four stamps would typically be serviced as four separate FDCs (although often sold only as a complete set), the norm for British FDC servicers is to affix all the stamps in a set to a single cover.

There are also not nearly as many different cachets as are to be found in the US, but what our British counterparts lack in number of cachets, they more than make up for in First Day postmark varieties. The Royal Mail allows individuals as well as companies to sponsor postmarks (often termed "handstamps") of their own design, subject to Royal Mail approval. These are often available for only one day.

One of the few War of the Worlds single FDCs I was able to find was produced by Benham Silk Cachets (Figure 1). This was one of a set of four covers reproducing movie posters of the film versions of Wells' stories. The First Day postmark from the village of World's End, Berkshire, pictures one of the Martian flying machines from the 1953 movie.







A larger Benham Silk FDC serviced with the complete set of four stamps is shown in Figure 2. The cachet pictures a different *War of the Worlds* poster, which was apparently the source of the artwork used for the postmark.

Invaders from Mars! - Cont.




Figure 3 Figure 4

The Figure 3 cover is the official Royal Mail FDC. This is the most commonly seen cachet, and may be found with a wide variety of postmarks. This cover features an Edinburgh, Scotland FDOI cancellation.

The cover in Figure 4 was produced by cachetmaker A. G. Bradbury for the H. G. Wells Society. The over-all cachet design picturing a Martian machine, which continues onto the back flap of the envelope, reproduces a painting by well-known British fantasy and science fiction illustrator Wayne Anderson. The War of the Worlds postmark from Bromley, Kent, shows a portrait of Wells.




Figure 5 Figure 6

The same Wells portrait postmark was used on the Cotswold FDC in Figure 5. Cotswold Covers, based in Marshfield, Wiltshire, have been in business since 1970. They are easily identified by their trademark large stylized gold "C" which appears as a $\frac{3}{4}$ frame around the cachet image.

A different Bromley postmark picturing a spaceship was used for the Stuart FDC in Figure 6. Stuart Covers began in 1966, but have since merged with Cotswold Covers.

The Figure 7 cover was produced by CoverCraft of Beckenham, Kent (which is not the same Cover Craft Cachets we know here in the US). The cachet pictures a warship battling a pair of Martian tripods in a scene from the book. The artwork is based on a painting by British space and science fiction artist David A. Hardy. Hardy has illustrated hundreds of book covers, and his work appears regularly in various astronomy and science fiction magazines.

The FDC shown in Figure 8 could also be classified as a Flight Cover, as it was flown in a British Harrier aircraft assigned to the Number 4 squadron of the Royal Air Force. It was cancelled with a British Forces Postal Services postmark, and signed by the Wing Commander.

The only hand-painted War of the Worlds single FDC I have found so far was created by W. E. Kington of Haxby, Yorkshire. The watercolor cachet pictures a futuristic spaceship flying above an English farmhouse (Figure 9).

And finally, Figure 10 shows a First Day Cover serviced using a business envelope from Mars Confectioners, the British branch of the US-based candy manufacturer Mars, Inc. Mars produces a large variety of candy, including M&Ms, Snickers, and, of course, Mars chocolate bars (although it should be noted that the British Mars bar is not the same as the American version, but is closer to our Milky Way bar). The Mars Confectioners corner card ties in well with the War of the Worlds "invaders from Mars" theme. Part of the slogan in the postmark reads "A Message Received from Mars."

My quest for War of the Worlds FDCs led me to join the Association of Great Britain First Day Cover Collectors, and I recently placed a (free) Wants Ad in their journal, First Day Coverage. Hopefully this will turn up some interesting covers, maybe even a few with a War of the Worlds single stamp.

While I'm at it, maybe I can find a few covers featuring another favorite sci-fi classic, H.G. Wells' The Time Machine (1960), which starred Rod Taylor and Yvette Mimieux, but that's a topic for another article...

Who was W.E. Kington?

Can any First Day Coverage readers tell me anything about cachetmaker W.E. Kington? Kington produced hand-painted, water-colored covers, and appears to have been most active in the mid-1990s. He didn't always sign his covers; when he did, it was usually on the back. Most of the Kington covers I have seen have an address label – some on the front, some on the back – giving his address as 45 Windmill Way, Haxby, York YO3 3NH.

Kington's earliest known cachets (so far) are for Science Fiction stamps issued 6 June 1995, and his latest known (again, so far) are for the Entertainers' Tale issued 1 June 1999. I believe he may have passed away in 2007, so he was very possibly still active later than 1999.

From the very little I was able to find on the US-based genealogical website Ancestry.com, I "think" W.E. Kington may have been Walter Ernest Kington, born 30 March 1918, and died sometime in January 2007 at age 89. Can anyone confirm this?

I would like to write an article for First Day Coverage about W.E. Kington, including a biography – did he have any formal art training? What was his vocation? Did he have a family? Did he sell his covers commercially, or were these one-of-a-kind covers produced for his own enjoyment?

I would also like to include a list (illustrated, if possible) of all known Kington cachets.


