Designing the handstamps for GBFDC official covers

I agreed to design the handstamps for the official covers at the beginning of 2019, having no experience with handstamps and I had to work out the process from guidelines provided by Royal Mail. In addition, Phil and Dot provided me a detailed explanation of how they created handstamps for which I am very grateful.

A handstamp can be a maximum of 40mm square, this is a very small space for an illustration that ties into the cover along with date and issue information. This size is also a practical limitation as we need to fit the stamps and the handstamps onto the cover.




Fig 1 - Unused Birds Of Prey

The handstamp must be sent to Royal Mail in time to go into the British Postmark Bulletin the month before the issue, that means for an issue in May we need to get the handstamp completed by the end of March. My first handstamp (Fig 1) fell foul of this rule even though we had been offered an extension and we had to scrap the issue.

The first handstamp we were able to use was for Queen Victoria's Bicentenary, this took inspiration from the cover and was based on a picture of a Queen Victoria statue. The original image for this handstamp (Fig 2) was rejected by Royal Mail who did not believe it could be made to print correctly. The handstamp was approved when the image was changed to a line drawing which unfortunately lost a lot of the detail.

Creating the graphic design is the main challenge, this has either been based on finding a suitable copyright free picture that can be used or as we did for D-day (Fig 3) taking a detail from the cover and reworking into a handstamp. The latter can be very complex as the image needs to be very crisp so requires a lot of editing of the fine details. Where practical I try to use some detail from the cover to tie the official cover and handstamp together.

Once the illustration is complete, we agree the location for the handstamp, this is normally a committee decision where we try to find a postal town that aligns to the subject. I then add the text produce two illustrations of the handstamp, one full size the other 4×1 full size and send to Ian Balcombe who liaises with Royal Mail for production.

James Cook Publication

Attached please find some sample pages regarding my new James Cook philatelic publication. Page numbers in the attached promotion are <u>not</u> actual pages numbers from the publication.

The publication is in TWO volumes.

The two volumes are case bound (hard cover) with pages sewn and stitched together, in full colour. There are just over 500 printed pages in large USA letter size (landscaped).

After getting quotes to print the book locally in Australia, it became evident that due to the weight of the publication (between two and three kilograms), postage was going to be too expensive to distribute the books from Australia. I have elected to go through a USA printer with a wide distribution network to achieve reasonable prices.

The pricing is on the last page of the attached file, in US dollars. This is a not for profit publication, so prices are at cost of production and distribution.

It is more expensive for me to personally receive and distribute books. All books will be distributed direct from the printer. I recommend for those living outside of North America to pay the extra US \$10 (or less) for Express post, as it is quick and tracked.

Ordering:

To order you need to send me an email with the following details:

Full name and address, including State, Postcode, and Country.

Number of books being purchased (note that one book consists of both Volumes One and Two).

Advice on which payment option you are using below.

Please note that I am one individual processing these orders, and I work full time in a very time-consuming job. Orders will be processed in the order that they come in, but it could be days before I get to process any order depending on my time constraints. I will not start the process of fulfilling any orders until after 21 February 2020. All orders that I have received (including payment in full) by that weekend should be processed over that weekend.

Payment options:

I am making no money on this publication, so can only accept the following payment methods:

PayPal via "Send Money to Friends and Family" and only in US dollars (not the Australian equivalent). The printer is paid in US dollars, so I lose on exchange rate conversion fees if you do not pay me in US dollars - your money will be immediately refunded if PayPal payment is received any other way. Payment to be made to my email address: kibbled@bigpond.com

Payment to my personal bank account in Australian dollars only. The exchange rate to use for the month of February 2020 is 66 cents to the dollar. I will advise March rates in the future. If you want this option, please ask for my bank details. Note this option is only available to Australian residents or

Mint Unhinged recent (not old) Australian postage stamps. This option is only available for those living outside of Australia who cannot use PayPal. Stamps can be mailed to me by yourself, or mailed direct to me from the Australian Philatelic Bureau if you prefer, using your account with the Bureau. Only "International Post" stamps are accepted (wording on stamps), and preferably in denominations of \$3.20 (see image below of one current issue available to be currently purchased). Again, the February 2020 exchange rate is 66 cents to the dollar. You can include any mint Australian stamps for rounding up to the correct value.



If you live in a country other than those listed in the promotional attachment, email me for a direct quote. You can get an indicative price from those listed.

The book is published under my own personal ISBN. I trust that you find enjoyment and value in this publication. It is a subject matter not previously treated in philatelic literature.



Shopping at Macey's

So what could be better than a quick trip to New York, we'll take in a Broadway Show, a trip out to the Statue of Liberty, maybe even a trip to Macey's, one of the World's most famous department stores.

Well this rather tatty, but unusual, 1968 cover was produced for Macey's to commemorate their Great Festival of Great Britain.

So the first thing we should say is it is a commemorative, rather than first day cover, the painting stamps were issued in August 1968. But you can tell from the illustration that the cover was designed to have the full set of stamps on, when a single value would really have been fine. On the plus side you could argue that it gave the GPO a great opportunity to showcase British stamps and their services in the USA.

The Festival seemed to run for most of September and was supported by the Board of Trade, who later reported 200 British companies took part and it had led to many extra orders. Unusually there is not a lot of information about it, or who took part on the internet.

Though not initially obvious the postmark is a running one and from the information on the insert cards it seems blank covers could be bought at Macey's, then sent back to London to have a special postmark before being posted on to the addressee.

For me though the most interesting thing about the cover is that the insert says it was produced by the Post Office, so though not their first official commemorative cover, I think it is one which will be missing from many collections.

The Chambon Mystery

Okay maybe it is not a mystery but I kind of like the idea that a small Belgium man would wander round Warren House trying to discover the truth.

I recently bought in a massive definitive collection which you will gradually see offered in emails and Cover Lover over the next few months. With these you really do need to check every cover, because there are always the odd better cover. For example with 1980 definitives most would be £5 - £10, but there are certain issues, much rarer, which may be £50 - £100.

One of these (or maybe two of them) are the Chambon Booklet pair issued 25^{th} June 1980, which I assume was issued without any notice, so collectors would have only spotted it after the issue day. These pairs of covers sell for between £50 and £100 per pair depending on the postmark, and this collection had three pairs, but what really caught my eye was the letter Tony wrote to the customer in 1984 about these.

So you should first know the covers in the collection were a Historic Relics pair with Chief Office EC1 postmarks, a Post Office pair with Windsor Counter postmarks and another Post Office pair with British Forces special postmarks.

So using the letter, plus the notes the customer made at the bottom, this is what I put together.

It seems that once the booklet was discovered to be rare, some of the staff of the Chief Office took to backdating First Day Covers, we can only assume for financial gain, a scandal ensued and they were prosecuted.

Quite rightly the customer was worried about his pair of EC1 covers in case they were forged. It seems that Tony contacted the producer of the Historic Relic series and his co-author of Collect First Day Covers, Bernard Townsend, who he refers to as 'the old relic' to ask him about them. Bernard comes back to him says he did not sell any of his covers as blank envelopes, so these could not have been one of the backdated pairs. This seems to have put the customers mind at rest.


Finally the customer notes he bought the pair of covers with the Windsor postmark at Stampex, which would have been in March 1984 and then in April bought the British Forces pair at a stamp fair in Bradford.

So to recap, and to state what we have learnt from these 35 year old ramblings, if you are offered the London Chief Office postmark on the 1980 Chambon Booklet pair it may be backdated, but if it is on the Historic Relics cover it should be fine.
















Britsh Empire Exhibition 1925

The date of the reopening of the British Empire Exhibition in 1925 was May 9th.

As is well known, FDCs carrying the 1925 stamps are very sought after.

However, there is evidence that some letters sent from the Exhibition on the reopening day used stamps dated 1924 because, it is thought, visitors were unaware that there were replacement stamps dated 1925. Apart from the change of year date, the stamps were identical.

In fact, for a while, collectors thought that they were the same stamps on sale again! So whilst not FDCs are such, illustrated is an example of the confusion that arose.


VE Day Bus

Post Offices Open During 1971 Strike

Further to Ken Brown's article in issue 151, Paul Howard has kindly sent in information regarding Post Offices that operated during the strike. He has also seen items bearing the OLDLAND COMMON, BRISTOL cds postmark, although it is not listed.

POST OFFICES OPEN DURING 1971 STRIKE

JOHN HOLMAN Editor, British Philatelic Bulletin

In The February 1991 issue of the *Bulletin* I looked back 20 years to Decimal Day in 1971. I recalled that at the time most post offices (except sub offices) were closed and that nearly all mail deliveries suspended as a result of industrial action which began on 20 January and continued until 7 March. It is well known that after the strike was over the Post Office provided first day posting boxes for covers bearing the low value decimal definitives (15 February); covers posted therein were handstamped 15 February 1971 and given an additional cachet explaining POSTING DELAYED BY THE POST OFFICE STRIKE 1971. These cachets have been recorded by James Mackay in his *Postal History Annual* for 1981, 1982 and 1984 and by Brian Pask and Colin Peachey in *Twenty Years of First Day Postmarks* (British Postmark Society, 1983).

Less well-recorded were the offices which remained open for business for all or part of the strike period and delivered local mail. Collectors in the area prepared and posted first day covers to local addresses; such covers usually received local operational datestamps. In most cases the numbers posted were probably quite small. In my article I listed the offices known to me to have provided a local delivery service. I was delighted to receive reports from readers of other offices and from these reports (published in the May, June and August 1971 issues of the *Bulletin* have compiled the following list. It is likely that all these offices serviced covers bearing decimal definitives, but it should not be assumed that first day covers (15 February) exist from all the listed offices. Some may only have operated for part of the period and not provided a delivery service on 15 February. Further reports would be welcome and should be sent to me at: National Postal Museum, King Edward Street, London EC1A 1LP.



AUTOGRAPHED COVERS

I was interested to read Julie Shaw's article about her autographed covers in the last issue of First Day Coverage.

Like her my interest in collecting First Day Covers was sparked by a parent, in my case my mother, who started sending me Royal Mail first day covers from our local post office in 1972. These all have hand written addresses & the local FDI postmark & cover a period upto 1979, though not every issue. Like Julie I have kept these for sentimental reasons.

I then started doing my own Royal Mail FDC's with local FDI postmarks until about 1981 when I began purchasing my FDC's from a stamp shop local to where my parents lived in Horsham, West Sussex. Since that closed several years ago I have done my own FDC's & sent them to the Special Handstamps Centres for postmarking.

In the early days I don't think that I was aware of other cover producers & so continued collecting Royal Mail FDC's. I also replaced all of my early hand written local FDI FDC's with better covers with special handstamps on, which I did back to the start of the decimal issues. I actually quite like the simplicity of most RM cover designs, although I realise they are less desirable to some.

I also collect autographed FDC's but not every issue. These I buy on any cover that I like, not just Royal mail covers, based on a combination of whether I want the particular signature, the cover design, stamp issue & relevance of the postmark. I particularly like it when all of the elements combine together in their relevance to the stamp issue.

I too have several FDC's in my collection relating to royalty & politics & have attached copies of some of my favourites.


The first is the wedding of Princess Anne & Capt. Mark Phillips in 1973. Although this cover is a RM one with an FDI I wanted it for the autograph of Capt. Mark Phillips. The second one is for the wedding of Prince Charles & Lady Diana Spencer in 1981 with the autograph of Sarah McCorquodale, Diana's sister. The third & fourth are both for the wedding of Prince Andrew & Sarah Ferguson in 1986; the first signed by Ronald Ferguson - Sarah's father & the second by Sarah herself.

Then there are 3 politics FDC's. The first & second are both for the 62nd Inter Parliamentary Conference in 1975; the first is signed by three House of Commons speakers - Bernard Weatherall, Betty Boothroyd & Michael Martin. The second by prime Minister James Callaghan. The final cover is for the London Economic Summit of 1984 signed by Tony Blair, Neil Kinnock & Gordon Brown.

Julie asks for the views of members on Royal Mail FDC's. Although they may not be considered by some to be of equal quality to those from other producers if I see an autographed FDC that I like I buy it regardless of what cover it is on. At the end of the day I think you have to enjoy your own collection regardless of what others might think.


