That's it from us for this edition. So for now, happy collecting and see you in August. Enjoy the nice weather, when it comes!



We hope that you will support the fair and look forward to seeing you all.



### **Location and Directions**

To reach the Collingwood Centre leave the M6 at junction 7 going south along the A34 (Birmingham Road). At the A4041 turn left at the junction of the Scott Arms Shopping Centre onto Queslett Road. Continue over the first roundabout (ASDA is on your right) and at the second roundabout turn left into Collingwood Drive. The Centre is along Collingwood Drive on your left.

If you wish to stay overnight, the nearest recommended hotel is the Birmingham Great Barr Hotel, which is only a few minutes from the M6 and just a little further on from the Collingwood Centre. Map below.



### Fair Do's by Peter Middleton

News of the demise of the Café Royal in London awakens memories for me of my early association with exhibitions. In the 1970's, my wife and I would cover many thousands of miles to set up our table at stamp fairs. There are very few towns that have not been graced by our presence, from Land's End to John O' Groats (including both of these).

The 1970's/80's was a time of philatelic boom with heaving attendance and revenue to match. Unfortunately in the current climate there are too many fairs, where, at the end of the day I will look at 'wifey' and utter the dreaded words, "well, that was a waste of time".

The financial outlay today precludes touring the country and staying overnight, whereas in the seventies the cost of hotels, table rent and petrol was minimal by comparison. A typical 'stamp tour' for us was:-

Saturday – York Sunday – Newcastle Monday – Edinburgh Tuesday – Glasgow Wednesday – Perth Thursday – Aberdeen Friday - Inverness

After the final fair closed, the stock was loaded into the car and we drove back to Nottingham. A couple of weeks later off we went again, as follows:-

Sunday – Bournemouth Monday – Weymouth Tuesday – Sidmouth Wednesday – Exeter Thursday – Plymouth Friday – Newquay Saturday – Weston-Super-Mare

This programme was repeated at regular intervals with different towns involved en route. There certainly was plenty of loading and unloading over the years we have patronised several fair organisers, who ball had different approach to 'setting up'.

I remember a particular fair in Coventry where we had booked a 10 foot table – (any size from 6foot upwards, in foot increments was allowed in those days). We were allocated space across one end of a central island. This meant that two 6' tables were placed together and the organiser told us not to use 12 inches at each end of the tables or he would charge us for 12' – don't laugh – it's true.

During the fair I noticed the organiser wandering past our tables, and I feel sure it was to make certain there was a 'space' at each end left unused.

One of the organisers I supported was Eric Syrett of Showpiece Fairs. These were always prestigious events, culminating in the exhibition at the Café Royal in central London over 5 days. The table cost in those cays (1976) was over £700 with car parking at £16 per day – a huge expense at the time. I hit on a bright idea to defray some of the expense. At this time we used to go camping abroad, and as there was a very good site at Chigwell, we decided to stay there for the week. The site was very close to the London Underground line that took us into central London 100 yards from the Café Royal. This site compared very favourably with continental sites as regards facilities – shops, laundry, hot showers, excellent toilet facilities. What more could you ask for. So, on the Monday before the fair opened we drove to London and set up camp at Chigwell. I remember the glorious summer evening as we walked around the site. The lower end looked across rolling countryside with magnificent views; unfortunately the present day outlook is of thundering traffic on the M25 – so much for progress.

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On the Tuesday morning we drove into central London and parked at the rear entrance of the Café Royal where unloading facilities had been granted by the Chief Constable (according to Eric Syrett). After a few trips upstairs with my stock, I came down and the doorman came up to me and said "sorry mate but the Police have just towed your car away" - what a joker I thought, until I saw the space where my car had been. I shot upstairs and had a word with Eric, who in turn contacted the relevant authority, who assured me my car would be released without penalty. Off I shot to Hyde Park Underground Police Pound where a queue of disgruntled motorists were paying their release fees. When I reached the head of the queue I explained to the 'Jobsworth' at the desk the situation but all I got from him was "I'll have to check, sit down over there". After one hour and the passage of many 'parking infringers' of all nationalities, I was called over and my car keys were slapped on the counter.

My worries were over, or so I thought. I parked the car and walked back to the Café Royal. When I got there my wife greeted me with some disturbing news. One of the dealers at the fair had complained to the organiser about the wording of my advert in the fair brochure. I had always taken a lighthearted outlook towards my advertising wording, but this particular fella didn't take kindly to a lad from the Midlands muscling in on 'Big Boys' territory. In due course he simmered down (after a few words from Eric) and nothing else was said. So ended my forage into the philatelic jungle of big time fairs. In due course I will relate more interesting experiences encountered in my many years 'on the road' and the amusing people I have met.

Our thanks to Peter for sending in this article. Might I ask what was the wording on your advert that so upset a fellow dealer at the Café Royal Fair Peter? I am intrigued to say the least. We very much look forward to reading more about Peter's time 'on the road' during his many years attending stamp fairs.

### Dear Editor.....

I noticed in the introductory section of Chris Sutcliffe's article about obtaining postmark cancellations from relevant local post offices on First Day Covers he commented that there is a body of opinion that believe that **FDC collecting is in decline**. Then I read on the BBC News site that the interest in the Doctor Who stamp issue has spread well beyond the traditional stamp collecting fraternity. This prompted me to think about how **interest in FDC collecting could be stimulated**.

I have thought of a number of measures that could be taken to boost interested in the pastime. Detailed below are some of my thoughts. I am sure other members might have equally interesting thoughts or perhaps some might think I am moving too far away from the founding principles for commemorative stamp issues.

My major recommendation is that stamp issues should be linked with major interests in Britain – just as Doctor Who has done and probably the Olympics. While the Hanoverian Kings of England produced an excellent set of stamps such an issue is not likely to catch the imagination of the public or engage too many interest groups such as history societies.

Therefore I would suggest that commemorative issues could feature, for example, achievements of Manchester United, who not only have a large support in Britain but across the world. A separate issue could commemorative the history of the Premier league – again something with international appeal.

The Post Office may have to think somewhat imaginatively to hit the topics that will generate a demand for the stamps beyond FDC collectors. Perhaps caravanning could be such a topic, plenty of great images to exploit while caravanning has a very big following, dogs and Cruffs might also be a suitable topic.

But I would like to go beyond picking

imaginative issue topics and add some 'excitement' to the pastime. Members might like to comment on some of these ideas and even add so of their own.

- Issues are timed to appear at the opening of key events – for example the opening of Cruffs or the start of the football season.
- Perhaps alternatively they could be issued immediately at the conclusion of a competition or event with the winners celebrated on one of the stamps – in a similar fashion to the Olympic Gold medal winners. The winners of Strictly Come Dancing, the X Factor or Britain's Got Talent.
- Additionally there is no need to have a 'full' set of stamps every time there is an issue. Stamps could celebrate the birth of a royal baby or royal wedding – featuring an 'immediate' up to date image.

In conjunction with these ideas I would like to see a reduction in the number of annual issues. If the post office genuinely believed this would improve stamp sales into the collecting world they might be prepared to adopt the policy. A reduced number of issues would give the remaining issues added prominence and importance and allow the post office to market them more effectively to the wider community.

I would ask members to help develop these ideas so we can as an Association perhaps present a thoughtful and powerful set of ideas to the appropriate people.

# Doctor Who gets more complex: Tardis has two perforations!

In an earlier report we calculated that there were 30 different stamps in the Doctor Who issue, although there is still some confusion about who printed what.

But amongst all the confusion we dealers and collectors often forget philatelic basics - and we have to acknowledge that we were not the ones to discover that **the Tardis stamps exist with two different perforations!** The stamp from the miniature sheet is perforated 14¾ x 14, whilst the one from the miniature sheet pane in the prestige stamp book is 14¾ x 15. (The perforations of the 2nd class 'Enemies' stamps are the same from both sources.)

The difference is easy to spot without even resorting to a perforation gauge because the miniature




sheet stamp has 11 holes above the elliptical one, and the pane stamp has 12. The stamps in the Retail Booklet & Generic Smilers Sheet also have 11 holes.

#### Addition

Royal Mail have usually made it easy for the self-adhesive sheets and panes to be removed from the backing paper for fixing to FDCs (or even postal packets) by ensuring that the die-cut perforations are interrupted. And this factor also demonstrates that perforators were used. On the Miniature sheet the Tardis stamp

perfs are interrupted on the end of the 3rd tooth in from the corners, on each side, except that the interruption is on the 2nd tooth from the bottom on each vertical side (8 in total).

On the PSB pane there are just four interruptions: top left and top right are on the lower side of the



first tooth, lower left is on the upper side of the last tooth, and lower right is on the <u>lower</u> side of the last tooth. There are no interruptions on the short side of the stamp.

Thus 3 are within the sides, and the lower right is right on the corner. This can be seen in the images as an uneven tear of the paper, rather than a clean die-cut, most noticeable on the top of the right-hand stamp in the image.

Similar differences occur on the 2nd

<u>class stamps</u>. The MS has interruptions on the top of the 4th tooth on each side (hence 8 in total). The stamps on the PSB pane have just 4 interruptions, in various positions and various sizes, on the last tooth on each vertical side (as with the Tardis).

### Incidentally the size of the Tardis stamp image is different on the Retail Booklet.

The stamp design on the Retail Booklet is  $17.5 \times 21.5 \text{ mm}$  but on the stamps on the Generic Sheet, Miniature Sheet, and MS pane from the PSB have images only  $17 \times 21 \text{ mm}$ .





### The Wilkinson Machine

By David Holl



This machine was invented by Mr. F. Wilkinson of Braintree, Essex and after several years spent in improving the machine, the inventor managed to persuade the G.P.O. to give it a public trial at the Chief Post Office in King Edward Street. The first day of use was 25<sup>th</sup> January 1912. The method of operation was that a letter was placed face upwards in the slot at the top and the handle turned after a penny had been inserted; the cover, thus franked was taken into the machine. The box was cleared every hour by a Postal Inspector, and the contents taken to the E. C. office where each item was date stamped, usually with a double circle handstamped LONDON E.C./172 At first black ink was used for the handstamp but by early February the colour was changed to red. The machine could only frank the one penny value.



INTERESTING POST OFFICE EXPERIMENT.


The Post Office authorities are about to test an ingenious machine which may save time, trouble, and cost in the stamping of letters. To-day in the General Post Office in King Edward-street the public may use for the first time an automatic penny-in-the-slot contrivance which renders unnecessary the purchase and the subsequent licking of the adhesive postage stamp. All one has to do is to drop a ponny in the slot and slide the letter through another opening as if posting in the ordinary way. The machine imprints on the envelope a circular stamp in red, with the words "Postage paid," and the letter is then treated as if it bore the ordinary postage stamp. The idea suggests possibilities of very wide development, but it must by no means be taken for granted that the Post Office authorities have made up their minds to adopt the new plan on any large scale, or, indeed, adopt it at all. Postage stamps are cheap to print and very difficult to forge, and the Post Office is quite satisfied with the manner in which they fulfil their purpose. The Department is merely giving the new machine—which is an English invention—w trial in this one centre for a few weeks, and whether the experiment will be exteended in a matter which rests entirely on results. Though comething of the kind has been tried in New Zealand the experience of our own Post Office authorities with other stamping machines readers them chary of hashly adopting any method which may lend itself to fraud, while they have perfect security in the adhesive postage stamp. The experiment is being tried at first only for letters requiring a penny stamp.

The First Day of use was January 25<sup>th</sup> 1912. On that day covers were franked by the machine. Along side is a cutting taken from the Morning Post announcing the introduction of Wilkinson's machine. It reads:

"Automatic Letter Stamping. Interesting Post Office Experiment". The Post Office authorities are about to test an ingenious machine which will save time, trouble and cost in the stamping of letters. To-day in the General Post Office in King Edward-street the public may use for the first time an automatic penny-in-the-slot contrivance which renders unnecessary the purchase and the subsequent licking of the adhesive postage stamp. All one has to do is to drop a penny in the slot and slide the letter through another opening as if posting in the ordinary way. The machine imprints on the envelope a circular stamp in red, with the words 'Postage Paid', and the letter is then treated as if it bore an ordinary postage stamp. The idea suggests possibilities of very wide development, but it must by no means be taken for granted that the Post Office authorities have made up their minds to adopt the new plan on any large scale, or, indeed, adopt it at all.

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Cancelled at 12.45pm on the first day – the enclosed letter quotes – "This stamp is quite a new thing this is the 1<sup>st</sup> day of issue and probably will be very valuable – it is an automatic stamp".



Covers bearing the Wilkinson machine frank were date – stamped at the Eastern Central District Office, usually with a double circle date stamp inscribed LONDON. E.C./172, and it would appear that this hand stamp was kept for this purpose. The cover opposite shows a time of 8.30 pm and number 73. The letter was probably discovered during the evening after the last collection from the Wilkinson machine, and was the most convenient handstamp to hand.

In February the 172 hand stamp had become red in colour instead of black, to conform with Post Office custom when pre paid mail was franked in red.




After the first few days of use when the Wilkinson 'Coin in the slot' was a novelty, the numbers of letters being put through the machine became less, until the last day of use August 31<sup>st</sup> 1912 when only a small number were franked. Therefore covers with the final day cancellation are quite rare.

Mr Wilkinson's machine was in use for 7 months and 6 days. Above is a cover used on the last day of use of the Wilkinson machine – 11.45 am LONDON E.C./172 and back stamped on reverse Croydon 3.0 pm same day.


